Online games can enhance teamwork and creativity

Add to the child's store of knowledge

Households with computers perform better academically

Improve both visual intelligence and hand-eye coordination

89% of 8-11 year olds said that using social media made them feel happy and 82% said it helped them to feel closer to their friends


But technology can affect children's development...

- Sleep cycles are affected by blue light from screens
- Screen-based entertainment increases central nervous system arousal
- Children today are more forgetful than OAP's

• One study found that the **more distracted** you are, the less able you are to experience empathy

• Gaming platforms use persuasive design in order to keep people using their product, and **children are particularly vulnerable** to these tactics.

What to talk about

- They can come to you if they see anything that upsets them
- Ensure they know that not everything they seen online is true or accurate to real life
- The importance of respect for each other and the meaning of consent







Dealing with Inappropriate Contact

What to talk about

• Talk about online friendship with your child – make sure they understand that a person they've never met face to face is still a stranger

- Sometimes people hide behind fake profiles for dishonest reasons
- Agree how they will respond to requests from people they don't know in real life
- Never ever to meet up with anyone they don't know in real life

Top tips / tools to use

- Set up safe social media profiles that don't share personal information
- Turn off geolocation settings on devices
- Use the strongest privacy settings on social media
- Learn how to report/block/mute
- If you have any suspicions about someone who is in contact with your child then report to



Conduct

Children need to be aware of the impact that their online activity can have on both themselves and others, and how other people may perceive them because of what they say and do online.


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
It's easy to feel anonymous online and it's important that children are aware of who is able to view, and potentially share, the information, photos and videos that they may have posted.

Dealing with Inappropriate Conduct



Discuss online bullying with your child - teach the importance of online respect and make sure they know they can talk to you if they have any worries or concerns.

If they are a victim of this type of behaviour:



Do save the evidence



Do report to your school/ the police



Do use online tools to report and block the perpetrator.



Don't deny your child access to a device or service. They may feel punished when they're already the victim.



Don't retaliate.

Dealing with Inappropriate Conduct

What to talk about

• Talk to a trusted adult if they experience anything upsetting online

• Think carefully about sharing images of others

• Be responsible online, remembering they are creating their own digital footprint

Top tips / tools to use

 Report inappropriate posts/content to the social media providers

• Think carefully about using monitoring apps that identify inappropriate behaviour

What are children taught in school about online safety?

 Use technology safely and respectfully keeping personal information private

- Identify where to go for help and support when they have concerns about content or contact on the internet or other online technologies
- Use technology safely, respectfully and responsibly

What are we teaching at home?

Our children will be watching the way we use technology and they will copy; do we **role model** good behaviour?:

- 1. Turn off notifications on apps to avoid that constant 'ping'
- 2. 'No phones at the table' rule or 'no phones between 6 and 7' rule
- 3. Buy an alarm clock so you don't have devices in the bedrooms
- 4. Family techfree days!
- 5. Keep phone on silent in your pocket or bag when you pick the kids from school

- 4. Use technology/apps to help manage screen time e.g. Forest App


